Academic Year 2006-2007**

***Our Mission:*** The philosophy of Milken Community High School stems from the idea that the world rests on three pillars: *Torah*, *Avodah*, and *Gemilut Hasadim*. The Office of College Counseling makes up a part of the pillar of *Avodah*--broadly translated as orientation or direction. The college counselors help each student research and select colleges appropriate to his or her interests and demonstrated abilities, and assist with making the transition from a Jewish high school to a college or university environment. To that end, students are made aware of the opportunities available at each college to study, practice, and celebrate Judaism.

***Our Purpose:*** The office strives to establish and implement an exemplary guidance and counseling curriculum that heightens and builds self-awareness, self-exploration, and self-expression among our students as they make the transition from high school to college. Our program is centered on the idea that the college search should be a learning and developmental process and, as such, each student must participate fully from practical, responsible, and ethical perspectives.

***Our Vision:*** Our success is not defined by the number of students who gain admission to a particular selection of colleges and universities, but rather by the appropriateness of each placement and the contributions our students can make to the colleges they attend. The office will continue to create and implement effective programming to awaken and support students' realization of their greatest potential.

COLLABORATIVE EVENTS (2006-2007)**

Each year, the Office of College Counseling collaborates with other high schools, colleges and universities, consultants, and guest instructors to present information from various perspectives. We also offer the use of our facilities as a service to our colleagues from other institutions. The following is a **description of events sponsored by the Office in conjunction with outside organizations** that took place during the 2006–2007 academic year:

**UC Information Night** (October 2006)

- A representative from UCLA presented information about the UC system and the application process to interested eleventh- and twelfth-grade families.

**UC Application Workshop** (October 2006)

- While tenth and eleventh graders were taking their PSAT exams, MCHS seniors were given the opportunity for a line-by-line overview of the UC application. Students reviewed their personal transcripts and learned how to locate their UC-approved courses and transfer them onto the self-reported grades section of the UC application. They also completed a mock on-line UC application as a group under the guidance of the college counseling staff and faculty members.

**Financial Aid Workshop: Parts 1 and 2** (October 2006 and January 2007)

- In partnership with the Oakwood School and under the direction of David Levy, director of financial aid at Cal Tech, this event for senior parents provided information on the financial aid processes at the national and state levels. Part one focused on the types of financial assistance available; part two was a line-by-line overview of the federal financial aid form.

**Ivy West SAT Preparation Course** (February/March 2007)

- Open to all MCHS juniors at a reduced rate, Ivy West provided a basic testing skills course on our campus for students who were preparing for the spring administration of the SAT.

**Case Studies Workshop and College Fair** (May 2007)

- In partnership with Archer School for Girls, Oaks Christian High School, and Wildwood School, this event for juniors and their parents featured participation in a “mock” admissions selection committee conducted by a real admissions officer. An informational college fair followed. Representatives from over 60 colleges and universities were present.

PROFESSIONAL CONFERENCES (2006-2007)**

Each year, the Office of College Counseling attends local and national conferences and workshops to build and maintain relationships with colleagues and keep up-to-date on topics related to college admissions. The following is a **description of conferences** attended by our staff members during the 2006–2007 academic year:

**Los Angeles Area Independent Secondary School Counselors (LAAISSC) Bi-Annual Meetings**

LAAISSC is a 35-member association of college preparatory school counselors in the Los Angeles metropolitan area that meets twice a year to share information and institutional data on various topics pertaining to college admissions. LAISSC is also used as a forum to exchange ideas on programming and network with colleagues.

**National Association for College Admission Counseling (NACAC) Conference (Pittsburgh, PA)**

NACAC's mission is "to support and advance the work of counselors as they help students...make the transition from secondary schools to colleges...." NACAC members meet annually for professional development and networking, and to learn about the latest trends in college admissions through sessions, seminars, and nationally-recognized guest speakers. In addition, a college fair, open only to high school counselors, enabled valuable connections with college representatives from across the country.

**California State University Counselor Conference (Pasadena, CA)**

This year's CSU Counselor Conference provided an opportunity to learn first-hand about the application review process through an admissions simulation. Counselors were also encouraged to attend rotating presentations conducted by various representatives from each of the CSU campuses.

**University of California Counselor Conference (Los Angeles, CA)**

This year's UC Counselor Conference focused on admissions practices and policies within the UC system. Through panel discussions, workshops, and debriefings, counselors learned about topics ranging from application review to the UC-approved course listing.

**College Board Forum (San Diego, CA)**

The College Board Forum is an annual gathering of education professionals (counselors, teachers, superintendents, university presidents, provosts, and admissions and financial aid officers). Attendees come from high schools, colleges, and universities across the nation and around the globe. This year's forum featured prominent speakers from the fields of education, politics, the arts, and science; over 100 sessions and workshops for professional growth; and opportunities to connect with colleagues and leaders from all areas of education.
